News and Updates



Thank you KBC for your donations of blankets, pillows and money. We were able to deliver 14 new pillows and seven blankets to Interfaith. They were very appreciative.

On April 25 we delivered support to the Northern Neck Free Health Clinic. The menu was fried chicken, chicken tenders, coleslaw, potato salad, rolls, brownies and ice cream. Many

thanks to our two new helpers, Margaret Denkinger for her brownies and Harriet Dawson for her coleslaw.

Israel - WMU Mission Project for May

"I will bless those who bless you." Genesis 12:3



Like you, we feel in our hearts that there must be something we can do for Israel and its people. After some research, we have found the most transparency in Samaritan's Purse. In Franklin Grahams' February Update, he speaks of dedicating 14 new ambulances in memory of the brave medics who were killed as they worked to save lives after the October 7 Hamas terrorist attacks.

Each ambulance bears the name and picture of a fallen first responder, plus scripture in English on one side and Hebrew on the other. Many of the verses are comforting Psalms written by King David, which is appropriate since the ambulances will be operated by Magen David Adom – literally the "Red Star of David," which is the Israeli Red Cross.

Samaritan's Purse has provided 18,500 food boxes, nearly 4,000 hot meals and more than 18,000 vouchers for families in need. (These were the latest numbers available and have greatly increased since published.)

After the delivery of the ambulances, 1,000 trauma kits left North Carolina. These kits are filled with 70 medical items, including a tourniquet, chest tube kit, suture kit, and intubation kit. Samaritan's Purse will provide each kit recipient with additional life support training to allow for the most efficient use of the new medical supplies.

Samaritan's Purse is working directly with Magen David Adom, Sheba Medical Center (the largest healthcare system in Israel), and The Ministry of Health to make sure these supplies will be distributed to first responders located the furthest out from hospitals or other emergency care.

Food Pantry



The April food pantry was busy, as usual. We received nearly 7,000 pounds of food from the USDA food programs and the Healthy Harvest Food Bank. It is amazing how fast the food is distributed in

the food pantry when the truck arrives and unloads pallets in the Fellowship Hall. Within 20 minutes, our army of volunteers had begun loading bags of food to be distributed after to our clients.

In April, the food pantry served 42 families (88 individuals).

A gentleman arrived at the food pantry after the truck had arrived and provided a bag of canned items as a donation. He was amazed at the number of volunteers and all they were doing to get ready to serve the community. After he looked at all that was happening, he opened his wallet and provided a sizeable donation to the food pantry!

We are so blessed with all the wonderful volunteers who support this community every month at the KBC Food Pantry!

Happy May Day!

"May Day", May 1^s, is a day we reserve for fun springtime activities and picnics. Festivities include children dancing around the maypole and decorating it with ribbons and flowers.




First recorded in the year 900 AD, the celebration mainly focused on the symbolic use of fire to bless cattle and other livestock as they were moved to summer pastures. This custom continued into the early 19th century, as cattle would be made to jump over fires to protect their milk from being stolen by fairies. People would also leap over the fires for luck.

Alternately, "Mayday", the distress call, first came into use in England in 1923. There already was—"S.O.S."— which worked well for telegraph signals, but there were problems with understanding it over the radio in aircraft.

So, the international distress signal "S.O.S." gave way to the word "May-day", the phonetic equivalent of "M'aidez", the French call for "Help me."

"COME TO THE TABLE"

Throughout the month of April, the Master's Blend Sunday School class studied a powerful four-week unit entitled, "Come to the Table," a study of The Lord's Supper. The class members remembered and proclaimed aspects of this gift given to the disciples and to us in order to remember our Lord and Savior. The members also examined themselves as they approached The Table. And finally, the members learned to express gratitude for all they had been given.



The final class session involved participating in The Lord's Supper. Pastor Dave Peppler directed the members through this experience, allowing for a time of deep reflection prior to the eating of the bread and the drinking of the cup.

It has been suggested that the reflection suggestions be shared with our church family through this newsletter as we approach Communion on Sunday, May 5. Please use these suggestions during your worship experience.

Prior to Eating THE BREAD, consider...

When we partake of the Lord's Supper, we REMEMBER THE PAST, EMBRACE THE PRESENT, and ANTICIPATE THE FUTURE.

The vow you may want to make: "This is my life, the life that is given to me, and it is this life that I have to live, as well as I can. My life is unique. Nobody else will ever live it. I have my own history, my own family, my own body, my own character, my own friends, my own way of thinking, speaking, and acting...yes, I have my own life to live. No one else has the same challenge. I am alone because I am unique. Many people can help me to live my life, but after all is said and done, I have to make my own choices about how to live."

As Christians, it helps to remember how Christ lived and died to help determine how we want to live and die...to help us make our choices.

It helps to remember:

- Though I am a sinner and have fallen far short of the glory of God, I have been forgiven.
- Though the world seems to be spinning completely out of control, God is in control and sovereign over it all.
- Though I often feel alone and forsaken, I am surrounded by a community of people who share my beliefs and hopes.
- Though the culture around me is sinful, violent and self-absorbed, I know who I am and who God has called me to be: forgiven, peaceful, and others-centered.
- Though I grieve over the losses and disappointments in my life, I know that beyond every death there can be a resurrection.

How will you choose to live your life?

Prior to Drinking THE CUP, consider...

"Enter through the narrow gate; for the gate is wide and the road is easy that leads to destruction, and there are many who take it. For the gate is narrow and the road is hard that leads to life, and there are few who find it." (Matthew 7:13–14)

When I take The Lord's Supper, I remember who I am and whose I am.

I REMEMBER a man who lived a perfect, sinless life, I remember His horrible death on the cross, and I remember His Glorious Resurrection.


When I take The Lord's Supper, I remind myself that Jesus Christ has changed my life. I believe in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. I am reminded of His life of servanthood and that the way I live my life should proclaim His.

When I take The Lord's Supper, I first examine my life...my relationships, my habits, my happiness, my finances, my health, my spiritual condition, and what I need to do to have a closer relationship with God.

I consider my blessings before taking The Lord's Supper...my material blessings, my relationships, my emotional and physical well-being...and I say THANK YOU.

I am proclaiming the life, death, and resurrection of my Lord Jesus Christ every time I participate in The Lord's Supper. This is serious. I do not take it lightly. I celebrate all that Christ's life has made possible for me. I am grateful!

VIS Myanmar Ministry and Prayer Updates – April 2024

Greetings from the hot summer in Myanmar!



Thank God, we are grateful that our educational ministry is operating well and that our God is watching over us and keeps us safe. We were able to start the summer English and Burmese language programs and are going well. We finished the sunshade in front of the school building and the drains surrounding the new building. We could continue with the preparatory works; teachers are currently organizing and preparing lessons for the upcoming school year. Works on the playground and parking area at the rental property has also

begun. We are always grateful for your prayer supports, please keep praying for us, and for the following needs:

people are terrified to stay in Myanmar as a result of the new conscription law and are looking for ways to leave the country. Thousands of people have fled Myanmar for nearby countries like Thailand and India, but many others are stuck and are still trying to find a way out. Occasionally, we hear reports that young people are being abducted at night.



- Currently, we are putting a lot of effort into
 getting the school re-registered with the current administration. Despite the numerous restrictions, we
 aim to submit on time by April 12, 2024, which is just one week away, with the assistance of
 knowledgeable friends. There are many payments were involved in addition to the numerous paperwork
 that needed to be completed. Please pray with us so that things will go well and for the acceptance of our
 application materials.
- At VIS, finding competent and dedicated teachers is a constant challenge. Young people fleeing the nation out of dread of the conscription law is an additional problem to this. We ask for your continued support in prayer; we believe that there are still God-loving and dedicated teachers are still in Myanmar.



- We continue to endure eight hours a day for power outages. As the temperature rises, there is an increasing need for better electricity.
- Thank God, the mission projects we are working with our partners are moving forward effectively even though things are becoming worse every day. And we pray for greater accountability to be shown to those affected by the rising number of



conflicts and displaced people. It is anticipated that the number of conflicts will increase.

• My daughter, Victoria, received acceptance to Dallas Baptist University. Even though she received several scholarships, we are still unable to support her with the over \$30,000 that she still needs. Please pray with us so that God will supply all of her needs.
