



Crowder's Corner



If you've been reading my monthly article in the newsletter, you know that I usually write something that is top of mind, based on what I've been doing. Today is no exception.

I have just come from a meeting with Paul Sciacchitano, a member of White Stone Church of the

Nazarene and local civic leader, to talk about housing in the region, and in Lancaster County in particular. This is the third meeting I have had recently with community leaders, and there will be more. Last week I met with John Bateman, who is the Economic Development Director and Assistant County Administrator for Lancaster County, Tina Reamer, who is the Director of Housing for Lancaster County, and with the Rev. Samuel Cain, Pastor of Calvary Baptist Church to talk about the same subject. Earlier in the month, I met with Kathy Vesley, the Chief Executive Officer of Bay Aging.

In each of these conversations, we have had a freeflowing dialogue about homelessness, housing insecurity, as well as numerous related concerns, like employment, job training, and generational poverty.

Of course, we are not meeting in order simply to ruminate on the problems. On so many levels, what we're doing is identifying persons and groups who are interested in developing initiatives, strategies, and ultimately solutions, but we know this is going to be a very long journey. Every person who has inadequate housing has a story. Each

person has their own life challenges. And some of the persons who have the greatest housing needs are experiencing generational poverty.

Recently, I met a young man who is currently unhoused. When he and his mother were evicted, she secured emergency housing in a women's shelter in Saluda. Because he is 25 years old, he was not able to join her in the women's only shelter. When I presented him with the option of emergency housing in Gloucester, he declined, saying that he would not be able to see his mother if he was that far away. Clearly, I am learning not only of the needs of persons who are our neighbors. I am also learning about the resources available.



Providing a person with emergency housing for three days does not fix the underlying problems that led to the person being unhoused. How did they get in such a bind?

What do they do on day four and later?

Right now, I have far more questions than answers. In the coming months, I anticipate bringing you updates about these conversations. When Paul and I left our meeting, he was going to prepare an email list of persons he knows who work in this space, including leadership from The Link, Bay Aging, Department of Social Services, the county, church leaders, and others. I anticipate that we might create a housing summit event where these persons and others interested in this subject might come together to develop a plan of action that could include things like a comprehensive survey of every residence in Lancaster County, a point-in-time count of all persons who need housing, and subcommittees who will work on workplace housing, emergency housing, transitional housing, and persons who work in the philanthropic space who can speak to the best way to raise, manage, and leverage funds to meet the needs that are clearly present in the community.

It occurs to me that some of you might want to be part of these conversations, and no doubt you will have ample opportunity to participate in conversations and much more in the future.

There are two verses that are constantly on my mind when I think about homelessness in 21st-century

America. The first is this: "the spirit of the Lord is upon me because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight of the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor," (Luke 4:18-19). These are Jesus' words quoting from the prophet Isaiah. The other verse also contains Jesus speaking. He said, "for as often as you have done this to the least of these, you have done it unto me." (Matthew 25:40).

Stay tuned for updates. I will let you know our next steps as we develop them. Blessings to you all.

Food Pantry News



September 17 was another very busy day for the food pantry. We served 49 households. Total individuals were 117 (21 children, 48 adults and 48 seniors). A special thanks to all the dedicated

volunteers who spend their day setting up the pantry, unloading the delivery truck from the Healthy Harvest Food Bank, packing carts for distribution and spending time with all the wonderful members of our community who have food needs.

We are now working to fulfill the needs of our clients for their Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners. We are asking for food donations or monetary donations for the holidays. Food donations could be the following:

- Canned cranberry sauce
- Packaged dehydrated mashed potatoes
- Canned fruit
- Stuffing mix

- Canned green beans or canned corn
- Canned or packaged gravy mix
- Canned pumpkin
- Canned pie mix
- Canned yams



Once we have completed our food pantry on October 15, we will begin procuring frozen turkeys and hams.

Many of our clients are in small households, so we purchase turkey roasts and small hams. We also purchase larger turkeys and hams for larger families. Turkeys will fill our 3 freezers for the November food pantry. It helps that we can get hams that just need refrigeration – we have a commercial refrigerator for those.

Monetary donations help us get what will be needed. In many cases, it is much cheaper for us to procure items, especially when we can get them through the food bank at \$.19/lb distribution/handling fee.

The KBC Food Pantry would like to thank all of you for your support! Your food donations, monetary donations, volunteer support and prayers have allowed the food pantry to support our neighbors in the community who are food insecure.

Our Activities These Past Few Weeks

Parent-Teacher Conference – This is the time for parents and teachers to talk about the academic progress of their kids. We are happy to learn that our students are performing well both academically and behaviorally.

Teacher-In-Service – We have a teacher in service once a month for a whole day, during which we often discuss, encourage, and learn from one another to improve our teaching skills, and then prepare for the next classes.





Humanitarian Aid – We continued to assist people in need with rice bags, a few bottles of cooking oil, and water filtration systems (Lilypad). We are also pleased to share that our missionary partners continue to preach and spread the gospel in their communities as part of their missionary activity. Our main responsibility is to provide them with financial and material support on occasion.

Victory Community Chapel (VCC) – VCC continue to meet regularly on Sunday mornings where we teach pure biblical

truth and engage young people in worship through songs and music. We are delighted to see more people getting involved in these activities. We use our tithes and offerings to support our missionary partners and to provide Sunday fellowship meals.

Prayer Updates

- School registration It's great that our school is registered, but the current government has several demands, such as a number of payments (always coming in large amounts), paper works and a ban on discussing religion (Christian teaching) in class. We need your prayer support.
- Accreditation We are still looking for accreditation or
 a strong partnership with other organizations or schools. Our government's education department also
 demands accreditation in order to ensure that our students can continue their education after VIS.
 Additionally, our high school graduates face challenges when pursuing their college degrees. Pray that we
 would be able to meet these demands.



New Building and Land for sports facility – Please continue
to pray with us for a new building or renovate the existed
building at the rented land as we were unable to do during
the last summer due to the limited funds we have, and the
unimaginable increase in building materials. For younger
students who have spent the last fourteen years in these
temporary classrooms, this renovation or new building
project is very necessary. Please pray also that we can
acquire a piece of land near our school building that is for
sale with a good price for the sports facility.



• For peace and justice to be restored — Please continue to keep us in your prayers. Additional restrictions have been placed in a number of areas as our current government intends to hold a general election in December. Please pray also for the safety of our teachers and students; as young people fled the country; older people are also forced to obey the conscript law.

We always appreciate your unending financial and prayer support. Please keep supporting us and pray for us. Please also pray for our projects and the required fundings. Thank you.
